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P R E F A C E

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BIOGRAPHICAL PREFACE

Gilles *de Corbeil*, better known as Aegidius *Corboliensis*, was a French poet and physician of the last half of the twelfth and the first third of the thirteenth centuries. He was a Benedictine monk, a student at Salerno, a teacher at Montpellier, and court physician to Philip Augustus, king of France. He composed several poems on medical subjects in Latin hexameters, a satire against the clergy, *Jerapigra ad purgandos praelatos*, and a Latin prose commentary on the aphorisms of the Medical School at Salerno. The last composition remains in manuscript form in the University library at Naples. The best edition of his works was edited, in 1826, by Johann Ludwig Choulant.

The first edition of the two treatises, *De*
urinis (Padua, Matthaeus Cerdonis, July
12th, 1483) and *De pulsibus* (Padua,

Matthaeus Cerdonis January 1484) published together, was made at Venice by Bernardinus de Vitalibus for Hieronymus de Durantibus on February 16th, 1494. From it this Spanish edition, the second, was copied. The commentator, in all likelihood a professor of medicine, says that for monks a work like this is as pearls before swine: “. . . Ad huius operis vestibulo planeticos ⁊ falsos difcurfos: monachos qui norma religionis abutentes: pelle monachali remota de huiusmodi artis misterio prefumunt prophanamus. talibus enī huius operis secreta nolumus proparari. nec margarite spargende sunt porcis: . . .” (*f*[27]).

Haebler (*v.* 2) gives the signature marking as *a*⁸-*e*⁸, *g*¹⁰. It seems evident that the copy in the National library at Lisbon lacks signature *f* (which this copy has), while this copy lacks the last two leaves of signature *g*. That Haebler is correct in ascribing ten leaves to this signature is borne out by the marking. Whereas all other signatures
